

100 YEARS

On January 22, 2024 the Village will be 100 years old. The Village of Clarendon Hills has experienced a lot of growth through out its history and continues to do so within the confines of its relatively small boundaries.

When the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad began service here in 1864, farmers initially used it as a milk stop. The scenic terrain soon attracted speculators, headed up by James M. Walker, then president of the railroad, who hoped to develop a commuter suburb. The area was platted in 1873 with a design inspired by landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted. Accordingly, numbered lots of various shapes and sizes were placed along winding streets which followed the natural contours of the land. The area was at one time called West Hinsdale but later named Clarendon Hills after a Boston suburb. Despite the hills, winding plat, and backers of influential

status, Clarendon Hills languished.

In 1869, Henry C. Middaugh acquired 270 acres north of the railroad tracks. Instead of subdividing his land he farmed the land and hoped to attract other wealthy investors to do the same. He tile drained his land, planted trees, and in 1893 built an elegant 20 room mansion. Unfortunately, the mansion was razed in 2002. Pieces of the mansion can be seen at the Clarendon Hills Historical Society located at 50 Sheridan Avenue.

Residents incorporated as a village in 1924. The one-room schoolhouse was quickly replaced by a two-room brick building. The first police officer was appointed in 1924, and a business district was developed to serve the growing population of commuters.

Residents in 1926 approved the spending of \$10,000 to buy the Village's first fire truck and to

build a fire station on the north side of the train line.

A real boom in Clarendon Hills followed World War II. Population increased from 933 in 1930 to 5,885 by 1960. Ranches, Cape Cods, and split-levels homes were built on the odd-shaped lots platted almost a century before; 45 of which are still standing today.

The Lions Club formed in 1950, built the community's first public swimming pool. The population of Clarendon Hills today is around 8,600.

Fun Facts:

Ogden Avenue was the first paved road within the Village

In 1930 concrete streets were added to the downtown.

Daisy Days (originally a sidewalk sales event) has been an event since 1964!

Orrin Goode was the first Village President in 1924.

Village Hall was built at 1 N. Prospect in 1965 and added onto in 1992.

The first Village Manager was Lloyd Church in 1959. He retired in 1973.

Country House on 55th Avenue has been in business for 50 years and the building is as old as the Village.

Today, Clarendon Hills offers a high quality of life for residents, including a low crime rate, top-rated schools, high average home values and a vibrant downtown, with access to the city of Chicago via Metra and highways.


