Dear Neighbors,

Thank you to everyone for your support and attendance at all our fantastic community events this summer. The Chamber of Commerce did a wonderful job organizing Daisy Days and the Dancin' in the Street Concert Series. We had record attendance. The festivities continue into the Fall with the weekly Farmers Market, Oktoberfest, the Centennial Concert, and Fall Fest hosted by the Park District. Please stay tuned to the Village's website and social media for more information on events.

Our events make our downtown and community vibrant and fun, with many families walking to our downtown to enjoy entertainment, food and drinks. With school starting and children walking to school, it is important that we keep our downtown a pedestrian-friendly destination. Per ordinance 18-05-12, pedestrians are required to walk their bikes through the downtown district. Remember that we all have a role to play in keeping our community safe. The Village Board is also exploring options to make additional areas in the community more pedestrian-friendly.

During the fall season, the Village staff and Board will focus on the upcoming year's budget. The Village continues to be well positioned financially with strong reserves, a solid economic base, and sound financial management and planning. The Board will work to appropriately balance taxes and fees with investment in vital public infrastructure and the preservation of high-quality services for our community. With this in mind, the Village Board will be considering the redevelopment of the property located at 104 Walker Ave, the swampy wooded lot on the corner of Park and Walker Avenues. The proposed rezoning of this property aims to develop it into a mixed-use building, with a restaurant and dwelling units; a decision that could bring significant opportunities for our downtown and the business community.

Another project being proposed is creating a TIF district in the 55th Street Corridor. The 55th Street Proposed TIF District is generally located along the north and south sides of 55th Street between Western Avenue to the west and Holmes Avenue to the east, and also includes certain parcels on the east and west sides of Western Avenue and Bentley Avenues, and the west side of Virginia and Clarendon Hills Avenues, all south of 55th Street. The uses within this area are commercial and residential. TIF is short for Tax Increment Financing. TIFs work by designating an area (the district), setting a "base" property tax value to properties within the district, and reinvesting any increase beyond the "base" value into improvements for the district. Taxing bodies, including the schools and the Park District, still receive their share by taxing the "base" value of the properties throughout the TIF's lifespan while the increases are used for economic or infrastructure purposes. This is not to allow for eminent domain. TIFs are a common tool used by communities. We have had success with our existing TIF on Ogden Avenue, which used to bring in Infiniti of Clarendon Hills, and the TIF in the downtown business district which has assisted many of the local businesses we frequent daily. I believe a TIF will be useful to maintain, renovate, and sustain the character of our community.

At our August Village Board meeting we recognized the Clarendon Hills Little League Softball 2024 State Champions of the 11U and 12U levels. These young residents represented our community respectfully on a larger stage and we are so proud of their accomplishments.



I thank you all for making Clarendon Hills such a great community and look forward to seeing you at our remaining events this year!

No Stickers For YARD WASTE!!!

For the months of October and November, Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS) will provide unlimited collection of yard waste containers without stickers for the purpose of leaf collection. To avoid any confusion, all bagged yard waste (leaves, mixed grass leaves, fall clean up, etc.) shall be picked up at no charge during these months. Simply place out with your other garbage without a sticker.

Bikes in the Downtown

Please remind our young residents that, per Village Code, no person shall ride a bicycle/scooter on a sidewalk in the business district at any time.

Bikes and scooters should be walked through the downtown business district.



Back-to-school time ...

can be busy for parents, children and bus drivers, so each one must do their part to help make the roads safer and look out for others around them. Clarendon Hills is a very walkable community. This means that many children do walk and bike to and from school. Please inform your bike riders that they need to walk their bikes in the downtown business district, especially after school. We ask parents to teach their children to look for cars and be aware when crossing streets and the train tracks. Drivers also need to be aware of all pedestrian traffic as well. Obey the speed limits especially within the school zones, and **put down the cell phone**. If you are texting child as to where you are when picking them up, wait until you have parked.

DO NOT DRIVE AND TEXT.

There are many students that take a bus. Please obey the STOP sign that pops out when the buses stop. Be patient and wait. NEVER pass a stopped school bus.
