Dear Friends and Neighbors:

Park District Winter Wonderland

The Clarendon Hills Park District will be a winter wonderland this year, and we encourage local families to have "snow" much fun in our parks this winter. With adequate snow fall, sled hills are available at both Prospect Park and Park Avenue Park. All sledders are reminded to use the designated walkways, and to be aware of others enjoying the hills. The hills are not monitored, and parents are reminded to supervise their children at all times. All sled hills close at dusk.

With adequate weather conditions outdoor ice skating is offered at both the Hosek and Prospect Park Tennis Courts. Please keep in mind that to begin "making" ice, we need an extended forecast of below freezing temperatures (32° F). In addition, three to five days are required to establish a solid ice base. "OPEN" signs will be displayed and the entrance gate will be unlocked when ice rinks are deemed safe and usable. Lights are on a timed "ENERGY SAVER" system and are activated with the push of a button from dusk until 10 PM. Rinks are not monitored, and parents are responsible for supervising children enjoying the rinks.

Internet Transaction Safe Zone

Buying or selling for the holidays? Since 2015, the Clarendon Hills Police Department located at 448 Park Avenue, has designated the police station parking lot and the police station lobby as safe zones for online transactions.

Anyone is welcome to meet buyers or sellers in the Police Department lobby during business hours. The lobby is open Monday through Friday 8 AM to 7 PM. After hours, the front parking lot offers a police presence, surveillance cameras, good lighting and an emergency phone. Staff will not get involved in any transactions but can quickly respond to any situation requiring police intervention.

Winter Vacation Tips

Keep your home safe while you're away by doing these simple things: Set timers for lights so they turn on shortly after it gets dark. A snowed in home is a sure sign you're not home so arrange to have snow removed from the driveway and walk ways if it snows.

Inform the police department you will be gone by completing a VACATION WATCH/UNOCCUPIED RESIDENCE / BUSINESS FORM at the Police station or on line at www.clarendonhills.us/vacationwatch. Stop deliveries of newspapers and mail. Most importantly, don't post on social media that you are out of town. The fun pictures and stories can wait until you are home.

REPUBLIC RECYCLING GUIDELINES

Paper: YES to mixed paper; advertisements, direct mail, paper, gift wrap, envelopes, magazines, newspapers and catalogs. NO to disposable diapers or rags and NO to soiled items like napkins and tissues.

Cartons: YES to cardboard and boxboard, soda and beer cases, milk and juice containers. NO to cardboard soiled with grease or food (i.e. pizza boxes) and NO to polystyrene foam materials coded #6 (i.e. egg cartons).

Glass: YES to clear, green and brown glass bottles and jars. NO to mirrors, window glass, Pyrex glass, dinnerware or any ceramics. NO to compact fluorescent or other light bulbs.


Metal: YES to aluminum cans, foil, tin and steel cans including empty aerosol cans . NO to needles, syringes, pots or pans and NO to gas cans or other items containing hazardous chemicals.

Plastic: YES to plastic bottles and containers coded #1 thru #5 and #7, but not #6. Six and twelve pack rings are also accepted. NO to plastic bags, film, Styrofoam or packing peanuts. NO also to plastic take-out containers, cups, plates or utensils; NO plastic toys, insecticide and hazardous chemical containers.

Unacceptable Items: Tires, engine parts, auto body or interior parts; Motor oil, paint, car batteries, antifreeze or liquids of any kind; Garbage and food waste; Wood pallets or construction lumber; Yard waste such as grass clippings, leaves and tree or plant branches (These must be in *Yard Waste* containers); electronic items, printer or toner cartridges.

Republic Services asks that all bottles and cans be rinsed and boxes flattened.

Holiday Lights Recycling!

The Police Department is accepting worn out strings of holiday lights and extension cords starting December 1st until February 1, 2018. You can find the collection bin in the lobby of the Police Department located at 448 Park Avenue. This program is part of the Elgin Recycling program. This is their 9th year of running a holiday light recycling program along with 49 Villages. Last year, Elgin Recycling recycled 103,243 lbs of holiday lights that would have otherwise ended up in landfills. You can find out more at www.elginrecycling.com

Christmas Clean Up

Republic Services offers free recycling for Christmas Trees and other live garland during the first two collections in January. All decorations must be removed. Place trees and greenery for recycling at the curb.

Holiday Refuse/Garbage Pickup

The following holidays alter the collection schedule: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Christmas Day. If any of these holidays fall on a Monday or Tuesday, all refuse, recycling and yard waste will be collected on Wednesday of the same week.

Refuse and Garbage Containers

Per Municipal Code 39.2

Refuse and garbage containers shall be stored in an enclosed structure or in the back yard of any premises except when set out for collection. The scavenger authorized by the Village, as per Chapter 32 of this Code, will pick up refuse, yard waste, and recyclables in accordance with an agreement between the Village and the scavenger. (Ord. 90-06-10)

Winter Parking Reminder

Residents are required to park off the Village streets if the weather predicts 2 or more inches of snow fall. This is to allow for proper snow removal.

Please note, no person shall dump snow onto any public road, public sidewalk or fire hydrant. *(It's recommended snow be removed from the top of your vehicle prior to driving!)*



Snow Removal Safety

When removing snow remember to know your limits. Push snow instead of lifting whenever possible. When scooping up snow, bend your knees and lift with your legs. Try to avoid twisting to throw snow. Take breaks. If using a snow blower watch your scarf and never clear the exhaust chute while snow blower is running. Stay safe.
