Subject: Weekly Report

1. **Closing of Metra Ticket Agent Service:** We received the attached notification this week regarding the elimination of the ticket service at the Metra Station effective the close of business May 7th. We anticipated this was likely to occur and have assumed so in our early plans for replacement or renovation of the station.
2. **I-294 Travel Demand Analysis:** Public Works Director Millette and I met with DuPage County staff on Monday. The County, along with Cook County, is conducting a study to obtain information regarding community concerns/interests in the central portion of the Tri-State Tollway. As you probably know this portion of the Tri-State is slated for a major re-build/widening in the next few years. Because of Clarendon Hills' relatively remote location from the Tri-State, Mike and I were not able to provide substantive comments on behalf of the community, though we agreed that additional access points between Ogden Avenue and I-55 would be helpful for the region. A copy of the hand-out pages showing the intent of the study is attached. If you have any thoughts or concerns please let us know and we would be happy to relay them.
3. **SSA #30 Tax Issue Update:** As noted last week a problem arose with the County's extension of the tax for the SSA #30 area. A letter notifying residents of this issue was sent to residents. We are still working with the County to confirm a solution, but as of now expect an ordinance for Board action to be presented at the May 7th meeting.
4. **Status of Employee Health Insurance (IPBC) Group:** Finance Director Potempa and Assistant Director Swiderek attended the IPBC meeting earlier this week. We had previously reported that Burr Ridge was planning to leave our "sub-pool" and as a result we may have to reevaluate how we provide health insurance for employees. Burr Ridge announced they changed their plans and will not be leaving the sub-pool.
5. **Commonwealth Edison Communication:** Attached is a communication we received from ComEd regarding rates moving forward. It seems to suggest that rates will drop slightly, by an average of about

\$0.50/month, beginning in January 2019. This is on the delivery side only, independent of what will occur on the supply side.

6. **Special Events Committee Meeting:** The Special Events Committee met on Tuesday, April 24th to finalize plans for the upcoming Dancin' in the Street concert series. It is all coming together, and we look forward to a successful season.
7. **Village is Hiring:** The Village is now hiring a Seasonal Maintenance Worker to assist Public Works during the 2018 summer season. To view a full job description, visit Carendonhills.us/employment.

Clarendon Hills ticket office to close May 7

CHICAGO (April 23, 2018) – Due to declining on-site ticket sales at its Clarendon Hills Station on the BNSF Line, Metra today announced that BNSF Railway will no longer staff the station with a ticket agent as of the close of business on Monday, May 7.

Ticket sales have declined at many Metra stations as passengers have switched to mobile purchasing. Although the ticket office is closing, passengers will continue to have access to the station facilities. The ticket agent position is being eliminated through attrition.

In 2017, customers purchased an average of 1,455 tickets a month at the Clarendon Hills Station, the second lowest number of tickets sold at all 12 stations staffed by an agent on the BNSF Line, which runs between Chicago Union Station and Aurora.

The station serves about 800 customers on weekdays.

“More than 44 percent of all Metra tickets are now being purchased through the Ventra App,” said Metra CEO/Executive Director Jim Derwinski. “Evaluating the best use of our limited resources and eliminating positions where sales aren’t high enough to warrant staffing is simply good business practice.”

After May 7, customers boarding in Clarendon Hills will be able to use cash to purchase a One-Way Ticket on board from a conductor at no extra cost. In addition, customers can purchase tickets from an agent or vending machine at all five downtown stations or through the free Ventra App, available in the App Store and Google Play.

On-site ticket sales were previously eliminated at the Riverside, Brookfield and Stone Avenue stations on the BNSF Line; the Mokena, 111th St/Morgan Park, 91st, 95th and 99th Street stations on the Rock Island Line; the Bensenville Station on the Milwaukee District West Line; the 57th Street Station on the Metra Electric Line; the Hubbard Woods, Kenilworth and Lake Bluff stations on the UP North Line; the Harvard Station on the UP Northwest Line; and the Oak Park Station on the UP West Line. All of the ticket agent positions were eliminated through attrition.

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About Metra

Metra is one of the largest and most complex commuter rail systems in North America, serving Cook, DuPage, Will, Lake, Kane and McHenry counties in northeastern Illinois. The agency

provides service to and from downtown Chicago with 242 stations over 11 routes totaling nearly 500 route miles and approximately 1,200 miles of track. Metra operates nearly 700 trains and provides nearly 290,000 passenger trips each weekday.

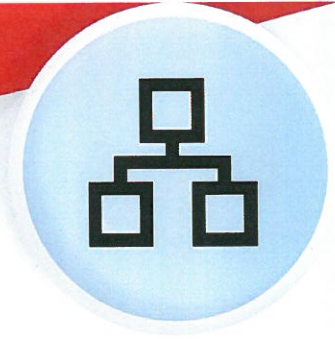

Dear Village Manager,

I would like to inform you that, on April 16, 2018, ComEd filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) its annual rate update under the performance-based formula rate authorized by Public Act 97-0616 and Public Act 97-0646 (collectively the "Energy Infrastructure Modernization Act" or "EIMA"). Specifically, ComEd filed updated costs, supporting testimony and other information required under EIMA.


This filing was made for the purpose of determining, pursuant to Section 16-108.5 of the Illinois Public Utilities Act, updated charges for delivery services applicable throughout ComEd's service territory in northern Illinois. As a result of this filing, ComEd anticipates that updated rates will take effect beginning with the first day of the January 2019 monthly billing period. The updated delivery service rates will include ComEd's updated costs of delivering electricity through its distribution system and will apply to all customers in the ComEd service territory. These charges are independent of electricity supply costs, i.e., the energy itself, that is provided by ComEd or by a third party (i.e., a Retail Electric Supplier) and is a separate charge on customer bills. If, as expected, the ICC suspends and investigates this filing, consistent with its process, the ICC will send you an electronic notice of this filing.

Monday's filing with the ICC would decrease the average residential electricity delivery bill by about \$0.50 per month, starting in January 2019. This is based on a revenue request that is approximately \$23 million less than existing rates approved by the ICC in last year's delivery rate update. This updated filing allows ComEd to continue our ongoing work to provide reliable service and to support and modernize the grid, while providing good value to customers with rates that are 14 percent below the top 20 U.S. cities and 19 percent below the top 10 U.S. cities by population as of June 2017.

ComEd's delivery service rate request for 2019 includes actual costs for 2017, when the company completed major grid modernization upgrades focused on reliability improvement, as well as projected investments for 2018 (the current year). The installation of a total of 4 million smart meters is scheduled for completion this coming October, three years ahead of the original schedule. Also reflected in the filing are expansions for new customer data and distribution centers, continued system reliability programs and new technologies, such as Voltage Optimization, which enables more precise and efficient energy usage while improving power quality.

Subject: Department Report

1. The 2018 Water Main Replacement project is nearing completion! Some storm sewer work was included in this contract in order to speed-up the ensuing road program. This work will be completed next week as will the final two water main connections at Arthur/Chicago and Tuttle/Chicago. Weather pending, the concrete pavement on Chicago will be patched on Wednesday necessitating a three-day (minimum) detour for eastbound Chicago traffic. General clean-up and temporary asphalt pavement patching will also occur next week. The contractor should be complete and off-site by May 11th.
2. The award for the 2018 Road Improvement program will be on the May 7th Board agenda.
3. Today is our Arbor Day celebration. Two trees were planted, one in the CBD near Aguamiel and the other on North Prospect near the elementary school. Forester Joe Ferrell also graciously hosted a lunch here at Public Works to thank all Village employees for helping us to maintain our status as a Tree City. Thanks Joe!
4. We have been working on our portion of the Richmond Education ahead of Westmont's efforts. Our work is in the north half of the site and Westmont's is in the south, so we must complete ours first. If Westmont went first, we would crossing over their new work to get to ours and would be severely challenged to not damage that new work. Also, our work includes the stormwater drainage and management which is primarily underground.
