Subject: Weekly Report

- 1. Metra Schedule Update:** As reported earlier, the final schedule for Metra has been released. Some changes have been made since the preliminary schedule was released. These include reducing one subsequent stop each on two of the express trains. This partially addresses concerns raised by many riders about extended ride times. They also added a Clarendon Hills stop on a different train which was also the result of multiple concerns raised by residents. More detail regarding these changes is attached.
- 2. Grant Information Update:** Also following up on previous notice, we are pleased to announce we have received a \$2 million ITEP grant through the State to make pedestrian friendly improvements in the downtown area. We have also been notified that the ICC has given us a grant for improvement of the crossing at the railroad tracks. This work will require quite a bit of coordination with the various agencies involved. Thanks to Dan Ungerleider and the rest of staff who worked on putting these materials together.
- 3. ILCMA Board Meeting:** I attended this meeting on Thursday morning in my capacity as chair of one of the committees. We discussed various issues affecting the organization and plans for the upcoming year.
- 4. DMMC Manager's Committee Meeting:** I attended this meeting on Thursday afternoon. Items covered included a presentation from a Nicor representative on ways communities can leverage their services to improve energy efficiency. We also saw a presentation by the HOPE Taskforce, which is working on programming to address the heroin and opioid crisis in DuPage County. Some materials regarding the latter are attached.
- 5. Sound Wall Repair:** The sound wall near Steeves Park has been repaired by IDOT. The damage to the wall had been a concern for residents in the area for months.

BNSF PTC Schedule Public Feedback Summary

Changes from Public Feedback

Concern: Fairview through Hinsdale express trains (Trains 1240 and 1250) now have added stops at both Western Springs and LaGrange Road.

Solution: 1240 will no longer stop at LaGrange Road and 1250 will no longer stop at Western Springs.

Concern: Inbound service gap between Trains 1232 and 1248. This affects passengers at Highlands and Stone Avenue.

Solution: Train 1232 (renumbered to Train 1236) will now depart Fairview Avenue 15 minutes later at 7:18 a.m. and arrive at Chicago Union Station at 8:05 a.m. The gap will be shortened at Stone Avenue with Train 1232 (Train 1236) departing at 7:40 a.m. and Train 1248 departing at 8:09 a.m. At Highlands, Train 1232 (Train 1236) will depart at 7:32 a.m. and 1248 will depart at 8:01 a.m.

Concern: Congress Park inbound service gap between Trains 1232 and 1256.

Solution: Train 1232 (renumbered to Train 1236) now departs 15 minutes later which changes the departure time at Congress Park from 7:31 a.m. to 7:46 a.m. Also, Train 1248 will now have an added Congress Park stop at 8:15 a.m.

Concern: Clarendon Hills is no longer a stop on Train 1224 which connects to Fenwick High School shuttle buses at Riverside.

Solution: Train 1224 will now have a Clarendon Hills stop at 6:47 a.m.

Concern: Midday inbound trains arrive too close to the top of the hour.

Solution: Train 1264 will depart Aurora at 10:20 a.m. and arrive in Chicago at 11:47 a.m. Train 1266 will depart Aurora at 12:20 p.m. and arrive in Chicago at 1:47 p.m. These trains will now arrive 10 minutes earlier than in the proposed schedule.

Concern: Limited reverse commute option to LaGrange Road during the morning rush hour.

Solution: Train 1201 will stop at LaGrange Road at 6:03 a.m. Train 1215 will now have a LaGrange Road stop at 7:28 a.m.

Concern: Congress Park outbound arrival service gap between Trains 1241 and 1265.

Solution: Train 1255 will now stop at Congress Park at 5:16 p.m.

Concern: Stone Avenue outbound arrival service gap between Trains 1245 and 1255.

Solution: Train 1249 will now make a Stone Avenue stop at 5:05 p.m.

Concern: There are limited outbound rush hour options for those using Western Avenue to access the outer suburbs.

Solution: Train 1263 will now have a Western Avenue stop at 5:20 p.m. To preserve train spacing, Halsted will be taken off of Train 1263 and now will be a stop on Train 1261 at 5:12 p.m.



The Problem

Nationally, regionally and even locally there has been growing concern about what we all do with the medicines that are left over in our cabinets. We take medication for so many reasons - for minor injuries, the occasional headache, back or muscle pain, to help relieve cold symptoms, for our high blood pressure or cholesterol. Over-the-counter medication, prescriptions, ointments and liquids....we often have medications that may be expired or no longer needed.

Unused Medications

- One-third of prescription and over-the-counter medicines go unused or expire.
- Unused medications left in the home increase accessibility, the number one contributing factor to all misuse and abuse of prescriptions and over-the-counter drugs.

Risks of Poisoning

- Accidental poisoning is the leading cause of unintentional injury death in the U.S. Nearly 9 out of 10 poisoning deaths are caused by drugs.
- Children, even when well-supervised, are exploratory and curious, they often have lots of opportunities to get into medicines in purses, cabinets and counter tops.

Teen Drug Abuse

- Prescription and over-the-counter drugs are the most commonly abused substances by Americans age 14 and older, after marijuana and alcohol.
- As many as 1 in every 4 teens in America say they have taken a prescription drug that was not prescribed for them.
- 90% of all teens who abused pharmaceutical drugs obtain their drugs from their home medicine cabinet or from a friend's medicine cabinet.
- A dangerous misconception teens have is that these drugs are safer to abuse than illegal drugs because they are prescribed by doctors.

Our Environment

- Whether they are put in the trash or in our water supplies, medications may pollute or have risks to our environment.
- Even though our drinking water is safe, low levels of pharmaceuticals have been recently found in drinking water of 24 U.S. cities.
- Studies are being done to help understand what impact these contaminants may have on our environment and our water supplies. In the mean time we know that we can reduce any potential risks by seeking out safe disposal methods.

Disposing Meds Safely

Bring your expired and unused medications to an RxBOX location that is convenient for you. The medications will then be incinerated in collaboration with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency using state-of-the-art technology.

The medications will not be reused in any way.

Disposal Recommendations

- Bring household medication including over-the-counter, prescription medications, ointments and liquid medications that are expired or unused.
- Also drop off asthma inhalers.
- You can bring medications as they are in their original containers or, for spill-free disposal, place the pills or liquid medication bottles in a zipper top plastic bag.
- Cross off any personal information on the label to reduce concerns about personal identification information.



Items NOT Accepted

- Sharps, needles or EpiPens®
- Radioactive medicines
- Any other medical waste
- Household chemical waste; these items need to be disposed of using other methods.

Household hazardous waste (HHW) can be disposed of at the HHW facility in Naperville.



Opioid Reversal Statistics






Opioid Reversal Statistics


January 1, 2014 – December 31, 2017

 - 5/10/2018- Water Tower taken out of service and start draining, staging of materials
 - 5/11/2018-5/18/2018- Exterior welding and high pressure washing (HPW), relocation of two antennae (SCADA and Village CB radio).
 - 5/18/2018-5/31/2018- Removal of pod on top of tower and repairs, interior surface preparations and repairs.
 - 6/1/2018-6/15/2018- Exterior preparations and coating application.

 - On Thursday, myself, Lt. Godek and three (3) on duty firefighters participated in a new construction walk through of the new building at 229 Park.

 - This week all three (3) Outdoor Severe Weather warning sirens had their semi-annual maintenance performed by Fulton Siren Services.
